Preventive Services Guideline for Children and Adolescents

RECOMMENDATION SUMMARY

The health plan supports the immunization recommendations for children and adolescents (age 0 through18 years) of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), which is recommended by the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) and approved by the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP), American Academy of Family Physicians (AAFP), American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ACOG), American College of Nurse-Midwives, American Academy of Physician Associates (AAPA), and National Association of Pediatric Nurse Practitioners (NAPNAP).

In addition, the health plan supports the American Academy of Pediatrics recommendations for well-child schedules (age 0 through 21 years).

POSITION STATEMENT
